The phone message indicated she was doing a high school project on "Mississippi Authors and Musicians." She left an email address at hotmail.com. Her phone message informed me that she had chosen me as a Mississippi author and needed to do a report for her English class.

I emailed Victoria letting her know that I would be glad to help her in any way with her project. I also gave her my Web site where she could find more information about me. My curiosity impelled me to check out how she came across my name. In one way, I felt honored that someone was about to check me out as a published author.

She emailed me in return, "Dear Mr. Tracey: I was just writing you to give you an overview on the project that I'm required to do in Junior English. My project is to do research on a Mississippi writer or musician. I choose to do a Mississippi writer and my teacher helped me pick you out to do research on. The requirements for this project are to list all of your major works, a biography, and interview, and an analysis/critical review of one of your major works. I guess you are wondering where I'm at on this project. Well. I'm reading your novel, and finding information about your life using your web site. I have to do an interview with you. I can just email you the questions that I want to ask you and you can just email the answers back to me if that is no problem to you. In her next email, she asked for the names of five persons who could testify to my personal well-being and writing skills. I emailed her some references.
